The American Embassy in Tbilisi invites you to enter into this BPA that establishes the terms and conditions applicable to future purchases of Window Coverings.

Scope of Services:

The Blanket Purchase Agreement (BPA) is intended to supply and install window treatments for government owned and leased residences. The work shall consist of supplying/furnishing all materials, labor and hardware and providing measuring and installation services, necessary to accomplish the work described below. Materials and equipment shall be ready made available off the shelf.

Window treatments shall include black-out curtains in occupied bedrooms, and roll-down blinds and sheers in all other rooms. They shall be offered in various colors and should provide adequate privacy and light restriction. Hardware includes, but is not limited to, rods, rails, hooks, pulleys and sidetracks. Every attempt should be made to use existing hardware.

Scope of works shall include, but shall not be limited to, the following:

- Visit the property no later than 5 (five) business days following the notification from COR/Embassy representative to measure installation site and obtain specifications.
- Remove existing window coverings before conducting new installations. Dispose of existing window coverings if deemed necessary. The Contractor will be notified in writing by COR/Embassy representatives to dispose.
- Provide resolutions of any technical problems that arise during the installation.
- Ensure that measuring and installation works do not disturb or damage any fixed property (including light fixtures, floors, carpets, or windows). If needed, first remove, or protect furnishings (such as furniture and rugs) by appropriate covering. After completion of the work, return all furnishings to their original position, and leave the work area free of dust, dirt, debris and packing material.
- Deliver and install window coverings as per the dates outlines in the BPA Call
- Supply windows coverings meeting the following specs:

- **Blackout Curtains/Drapes**
- **Sheer Curtains**

- **Window and Door Blinds – Vertical (metal)**
- **Window and Door Blinds – Vertical (wooden)**
- **Window and Door Blinds – Horizontal**
- **Roman Blinds**
- **Installation Cost per M2 of Curtains**
- **Installation Cost per M2 of Blinds**

Note: The prices shall be provided by the Contractor per m2 or linear meters. The Contractor shall be responsible for accurate measurements in each residence during a site visit before the start of manufacturing and installation of curtains/blinds/sheers.

VALUE ADDED TAX. Value Added Tax (VAT) is not applicable to this agreement and shall not be included in the rates or Invoices because the U.S. Embassy has a tax exemption certificate from the host government.

The vendor shall provide the Embassy with a warranty list for the provided goods and installation services, where he will explain in the clear manner the scope, conditions, terms and duration of the warranty as well as the manner in which eventual claim should be applied and addressed. The warranty commences on the day of installation of the provided goods and its duration is 24 months.

The warranty does not apply to the following claims:

- a. Mechanical damage
- b. Carelessness and neglect
- c. Excessive load
- d. Any defects which were the result of modification of the product by the user
- e. Any defects which were the result of force majeure or natural disasters.

2. Expiration Date

BPA is valid for up to 5 years from the date of signature.

3. Embassy Estimate

The Embassy estimates that the volume of purchases through this agreement will be below 400.000,00 GEL.

4. Terms and Conditions

- The Embassy is **not** obligated to purchase any definite amount under this agreement.

- No single purchase will exceed \$5,000 USD/ or the equivalent in local currency based on the USG disbursing agency exchange rate.
- The total amount ordered under this agreement will not exceed \$250,000 or the equivalent in local currency based on the USG disbursing agency exchange rate.
- The prices to the Government shall be as low or lower than those charged your most favored customers for comparable quantities under similar terms and conditions, in addition to any discount for prompt payment.

5. Authorized Employees

The following employees are authorized to place orders:

(4) Telecommunications or video surveillance equipment or services produced or provided by an entity that the Secretary of Defense, in consultation with the Director of National Intelligence or the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, reasonably believes to be an entity owned or controlled by, or otherwise connected to, the government of a covered foreign country.

Critical technology means—

(1) Defense articles or defense services included on the United States Munitions List set forth in the International Traffic in Arms Regulations under subchapter M of chapter I of title 22, Code of Federal Regulations;

(2) Items included on the Commerce Control List set forth in Supplement No. 1 to part 774 of the Export Administration Regulations under subchapter C of chapter VII of title 15, Code of Federal Regulations, and controlled-

(i) Pursuant to multilateral regimes, including for reasons relating to national security, chemical and biological weapons proliferation, nuclear nonproliferation, or missile technology; or

(ii) For reasons relating to regional stability or surreptitious listening;

(3) Specially designed and prepared nuclear equipment, parts and components, materials, software, and technology covered by part 810 of title 10, Code of Federal Regulations (relating to assistance to foreign atomic energy activities);

(4) Nuclear facilities, equipment, and material covered by part 110 of title 10, Code of Federal Regulations (relating to export and import of nuclear equipment and material);

(5) Select agents and toxins covered by part 331 of title 7, Code of Federal Regulations, part 121 of title 9 of such Code, or part 73 of title 42 of such Code; or

(6) Emerging and foundational technologies controlled pursuant to section 1758 of the Export Control Reform Act of 2018 (50 U.S.C. 4817).

Interconnection arrangements means arrangements governing the physical connection of two or more networks to allow the use of another's network to hand off traffic where it is ultimately delivered (*e.g.*, connection of a customer of telephone provider A to a customer of telephone company B) or sharing data and other information resources.

Reasonable inquiry means an inquiry designed to uncover any information in the entity's possession about the identity of the producer or provider of covered telecommunications equipment or services used by the entity that excludes the need to include an internal or third-party audit.

Roaming means cellular communications services (e.g., voice, video, data) received from a visited network when unable to connect to the facilities of the home network either because signal coverage is too weak or because traffic is too high.
